COURSE DESCRIPTION

The HCC field school is a six-credit, four-week experiential field school designed to introduce students to practical heritage and culture management skills. Fieldwork will focus on Yukon heritage and cultural resource management including issues relating to archaeology, conservation, archives, oral history, collections, and historic sites. Results of the project will be presented in a seminar.

PREREQUISITES

The prerequisite for ANTH 144 is admission into the School of Liberal Arts.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

- Identify practical heritage and culture management skills

- Determine the logistics and cost of organizing community projects such as field camps and activities such as archaeology excavations and culture camps
- Write basic technical reports on various cultural resource management topics

This course will be delivered through direct classroom contact and fieldwork.
