COURSE DESCRIPTION

The focus of this course is to explore traditional and contemporary beadwork techniques of North America. Students will complete projects using three main styles of beadwork: loom, lazy stitch and appliqué. A few related bead-work techniques will also be presented: edge beadwork, brick stitch, beaded fringe and peyote stitch. Students will use these beadwork skills and apply quality-control standards to make a choker, a small bag, and a key chain. Students will also complete a bead chart and sample charts of beadwork techniques.

This skill-based course will be a total of 45 class hours and will be taught using hands-on learning techniques, small group work, class discussions, elder involvement, peer learning, demonstrations and audio-visual aids.
