COURSE DESCRIPTION

Holistic interdisciplinary nursing care and skills are emphasized within the framework of the nursing process. Focus is on the principles underlying nursing knowledge required to care for clients in the medical/surgical environment. Nursing competencies introduced in the classroom are practiced and assessed in the nursing laboratory.

- Demonstrates the principles and techniques of safe infusion therapy for peripheral and central lines, epidural and spinal infusions
- Initiate and monitor infusion therapy including blood, medication, and intravenous fluids (including nasogastric tube replacement)
- Understand and perform safe phlebotomy principles and techniques
- Incorporate advanced interventions using the nursing process, decision making skills and nursing judgement and evaluate their effectiveness

- Anticipate and address changing requirements for patients with complex needs in situations involving a higher acuity of care
- Demonstrate an understanding of the Determinants of Health may impact an individual and their family when in an acute care nursing area
- Prioritize nursing actions based upon patient information
- Relate the theoretical components of pathophysiology, pharmacology, medication administration, and critical thinking to a variety of complex circumstances
- Troubleshoot adverse patient reactions to nursing interventions
- Apply knowledge and skills to document nursing assessments and care accurately following accepted professional and legal standards.

COURSE FORMAT

This course will include a total of 90 hours of in person lab instruction, lab assessments and quizzes/exams. Learning activities may include but are not limited to facilitator-led learning, projects, in-class and asynchronous (web-based via Moodle) and on-line exercises.
