Open Library is a project managed by the organization Internet Archive involving hundreds of partner libraries around the world, including Yukon College Library. You can browse e-books, read books online, or borrow items from the partner libraries through our open wireless network.

Text Archive [<http://www.archive.org/details/texts>]

Text Archive is part of the project Internet Archive, and contains a wide range of fiction, popular books, children's books, historical texts and academic books. Some items might have restrictions on bulk re-use and commercial use.

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Digital Penn [<http://www.library.upenn.edu/digitalpenn/>]

Looking for titles on news, special exhibitions, and other e-book collections? Search this website to find over 16,000 such items.



How it works: Click on “E-Collections/Content” tab and then use the left menu to navigate through the Penn libraries digital collections. Collections include manuscripts, images, and audio files.

Online Medieval and Classic Library [<http://omacl.org/>]

A unique collection of exclusively Classical and Medieval literacy works.



How it works: Works are only available as webpages. Unfortunately, HTML documents are not available offline and rarely print well unless formatted properly. Try copying and pasting the texts into Word documents for printing.

Historical Materials

The Jesuit Relations and Allied Documents, 1610 to 1791

This site has a very specific collection of documents that contain an entire translation of one piece of work that has been translated into English and put into HTML format. Be forewarned that there has been no editing or professional scanning so there may be a few transcription errors.



How it works: On the homepage there is a listing of the Table of Contents. Scroll the listing to find a section to select, and then click on the hyperlink to view the text in HTML. The webpages are excessively long, be aware of that if you decide to print a paper copy.

Making of America [<http://ebooks.library.cornell.edu/m/moa/>]

Making of America (MOA) is a digital library collection, which is an extension of the Cornell University Library. The collection focuses on early Americana; from the antebellum period through reconstruction. Access is available to 267 monographs (books) and over 100,000 journal articles. All viewed material is digitally scanned versions of the originals. Optical Character Recognition (OCR) has been used to enhance the scanned images.



How it works: From the homepage, click on one of the 2 search options (“search” or “browse”) listed on the top menu. Be aware that the library displays materials in frames in TIF format, which can make printing materials and saving URLs difficult. To view pages separately for printing or the unique URL, right click on the page and select to open the page in a new window or tab.
